# Bach to Books Presents



## Ocarina Diva Cris Gale

Come hear one of the world's oldest musical instruments when Allen's own "Ocarina Diva" Cris Gale performs at **7:30 p.m. Thursday, August 11**, at the Allen Public Library Auditorium.

She will be performing classical standards as well as contemporary and classical pieces from Asia. Cris explains, "I suppose the program could be described as East/West Classical Fusion."

Sponsored by Bach to Books, this program is free and no reservations are required.



From the United States to Switzerland to Senegal, Italy to Japan, ocarinas bring peoples of the world together. Primitive forms of these instruments have been excavated from sites of various ancient civilizations, including Aztecs, Mayans, Chinese and Pacific Islanders. Because of its portability and versatility, the ocarina continues to be popular in contemporary cultures, and has been featured in the popular video game, *The Legend of Zelda: The Ocarina of Time*.

Cris began playing the ocarina in 1999, and since then, she has performed at renaissance festivals, weddings, and as a studio musician for a meditation CD. In 2009, she won St. Louis (STL) Ocarina's International Search Competition and subsequently joined STL Ocarina as a consultant and performer. Cris declares, "It is just something that I deeply enjoy doing that happens to bring me peace and happiness. I can't imagine life without it. When I attended the ocarina festival, I met a maker/performer from Norway that lost one of his hands in an accident. He made himself a special ocarina so that he could keep playing. Despite what's happened to him, he continues to make beautiful music. I don't think he had a choice. I think that once music gets a hold on you, it never lets go."

One of the more interesting venues was at a friend's Indian wedding. Cris's knowledge of Indian music was negligible but the piece that was selected was extremely soothing for her to play. She described the experience as very beautiful and somewhat surreal.

## Germania author Brendan McNally

After Adolph Hitler committed suicide, what happened during those final twenty-three days of the Third Reich? Heinrich Himmler and Albert Speer collaborated with Grand Admiral Dönitz, hoping they might have positions in the new government. Dönitz established the last government of the Third Reich in the gymnasium of the German Naval Academy, located outside of Kiel.

Brendan McNally discusses his book, *Germania*, historical fiction that accurately describes this chaotic period, at **7 p.m. Thursday, August 18**, at the Allen Public Library Auditorium.

Before turning to fiction writing, this Dallas author was a defense journalist, at the Pentagon and then in Prague, where he covered the Eastern European arms trade and intelligence issues. McNally currently writes articles for *D Magazine*, *Smithsonian Air & Space*, and *GX Magazine*. His first novel, *Germania*, is a darkly comic account of the last days of the Third Reich, told by Hitler's architect and best friend Albert Speer, and four identical quadruplets, the Flying Magical Loerber Brothers.


Following Hitler's death, Speer was at Admiral Dönitz' headquarters at Flensburg. Dönitz had been appointed the new head of state, and he established a new government. In addition to surrendering to the Allied forces, he administered this regime. Speer collaborated with Werner Baumbach, with whom he used to kayak on the Havel. Baumbach had possession of these gigantic flying boats (BV-222), at that time the biggest airplane in the world. One night over whiskey, he suggested to Speer that the two of them fly away to Greenland, and spend the summer fishing, hunting walrus, and writing their memoirs together. Brendan declares, "This was a Nazi version of Thoreau and Emerson!"

Wall Street lawyers and economists, including John Kenneth Galbraith, who represented a group called The United States Strategic Bombing Survey, interviewed Speer for almost a week about the challenges of keeping German industry rolling in the face of the American Strategic Bombing Campaign. Brendan declares, "In my story, Albert Speer abandons one magician and takes up with another. It made sense to me, because that's what people do when they give up on one god. They go find another. I wanted my book to be a kind of tragic slapstick."

## Bach to Books

### Tuskegee Airman

The Allen Public Library will feature Tuskegee Airman Lt. Calvin Spann, at 7:30 p.m., Thursday, July 14, Allen Public Library Auditorium. He will discuss the rigorous training at the Tuskegee University Moton Airfield, aerial campaigns during World War II that included traversing the treacherous Alps and encountering a newly invented German weapon-jet aircraft.



Under the direction of Col. Benjamin Davis, Jr., 450 of the Tuskegee Airman, as the Tuskegee-trained pilots came to be known, flew World War II missions over North Africa and Europe in P-39, P-40, P-47 and P-50 aircraft. These men served in either the 99<sup>th</sup> Fighter Squadron or the 332<sup>nd</sup> Fighter Group. The first black West Point graduate, Col. Davis was one of the five who graduated from of a class of originally 13 men in the first nine-month training at Tuskegee. Col. Davis later earned the distinction of being the U.S. Air Force's first African American general.

Eventually, the 332<sup>nd</sup> Fighter Group consisted of four fighter squadrons—the 99<sup>th</sup>, 100<sup>th</sup>, 301<sup>st</sup>, and 302<sup>nd</sup>. The 99<sup>th</sup> Fighter Squadron received two Presidential Unit Citations for their tactical air support and air combat in Italy in 1943 and 1944, and the 332<sup>nd</sup> Fighter Group earned a Presidential Unit Citation for their mission escorting bombers to Berlin in March of 1945. These brave airmen also distinguished themselves by achieving the singular distinction of never losing an escorted bomber to enemy plane fire.

Juanita Posey, Commander of Armistice Memorial Post 2195, declares, "As a young, black woman from the South in the late 80's, my future opportunities were presented to me in minimal options. As a Naval JROTC student, my exposure of heroism in the face of racism was amplified with my introduction to the Tuskegee Airmen. Their sacrifice to prove that they were capable in spite of their skin color gives me the courage to do the same."

This is an exciting opportunity to hear an eyewitness to history's biggest war. Boy Scout Troop 328 will present the colors to commence the program. After the program, Mr. Spann will be available for questions and photographs. A reception with refreshments will follow.

Calvin and his wife Gwenelle, reside in Allen and give talks to schools and libraries on the role of Tuskegee Airmen.

## E-Flat Porch Band



Do you recall when friends and neighbors sat on the porch and entertained themselves and each other by playing tunes on their own instruments as well as household objects such as jugs and washboards? Long to experience music without batteries or earbuds? Treat

yourself to an evening with the E-Flat Porch Band at **7:30 p.m. Thursday, July 21**, at the Allen Public Library—it's sure to boost your spirits and energize the start of your weekend.

Rudy Littrell and Duane Brown's "porch music" is played on acoustic instruments and pays homage to our varied Texas musical roots. Their style is influenced by country blues, Texas folk music, jazz and swing standards, and Depression Era country songwriters. Other instruments include the acoustic bass, harmonica, cymbal, and a drum-like instrument of their own design made out of a wooden soda pop box. This is a small band with a big sound—up to eight instruments will be heard simultaneously, along with harmonizing vocals.

A self-proclaimed "recovering percussionist," Rudy Littrell has the coordination to play four instruments at once—acoustic bass, high hat, harmonica, and a wooden soda pop box.

Duane Brown has been making music since he was a kid, strumming a broom and singing Roger Miller tunes. He has since advanced to the guitar and harmonica.

"Rudy noticed that every time he hit an E-flat, the porch would resound," said Brown's wife and band publicist, Adah Leah Wolf. Thus, the E-Flat Porch became the duo's name. The E-Flatters present an educational and entertaining introduction to folk music.

The E-Flat Porch Band has performed at folk and blues festivals throughout the Southwest, Texas Metal Arts Festival in Gruene, Folk Festival in Denton, Richardson's Wildflower Festival, Texas Arts and Crafts Fair in Kerrville, and Texas Folklife Festival in San Antonio.

## Lifetime Friend 2011

## Library Endowment Fund Making a Splash

### Allen Wranglers Help Friends Endowment Fund

The Allen Wranglers football team provided the Library Endowment Fund with a booth for the May 7 game against Nebraska. The league-leading Wranglers defeated Nebraska 49-23 to clinch a playoff spot. The Fund raffled off a Wranglers game football with autographs from Roger Staubach, Tony Hill, Drew Pearson, and Everson Walls. Net results from the raffle was \$255.

## State Budget Update

It is a scary time for libraries. State, county and federal funding of libraries is being slashed due to budget constraints. Here are some of the cuts the state has made:

- State and Federal funding for Texas libraries cut from \$70.8M for 2010/2011 to \$41M for 2012/2013;
- \$29.8M reduction, about one-third, in Library Resource Sharing (includes Texshare databases) and two-thirds in Aid to Local Libraries (includes Loan Star grants);
- The Loan Star Grant program, which provided funding to every public library in Texas, will be eliminated after this August;
- The Texshare databases will continue in some form through June 2012, but the Library's financial share will increase and database availability may change.



## We Want YOUR Books!

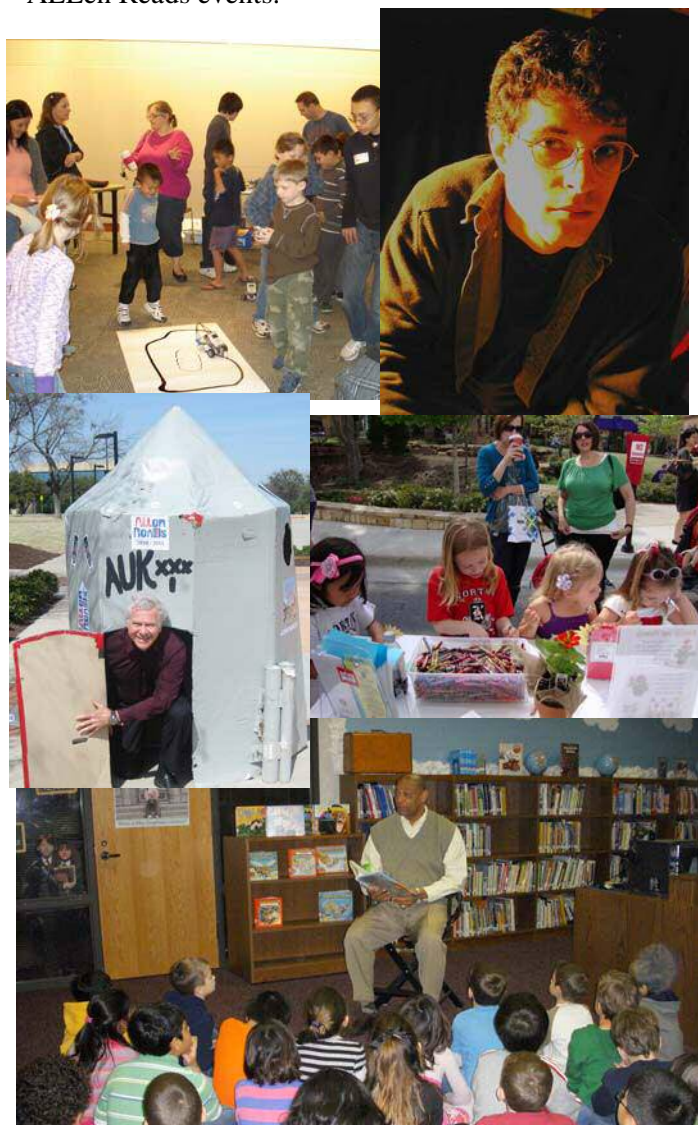

# Sample Recipes from Chocolate Friendly Cookbook

## IRISH CHOCOLATE CAKE

$\frac{3}{4}$  c flour                       $\frac{3}{4}$  tsp baking powder  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp salt                      2 oz dark chocolate  
4 oz butter                      6 oz sugar  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  c mashed potato        2 eggs, beaten  
4 Tbsp milk

Preheat oven to 375°F. Grease two 8" cake pans. Sift flour, baking powder and salt; set aside. Melt chocolate slowly in microwave. In separate bowl, cream butter and sugar then beat in chocolate and mashed potatoes. Gradually beat in eggs along with a little flour with each addition. Fold in rest of flour. Stir in milk. Divide in 2 pans. Bake 20-25 minutes.

### ICING:

4 oz dark chocolate  
2 oz confectioners sugar  
3 tsp Irish cream liquor  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  c heavy cream

Melt chocolate slowly in microwave. Stir in cream, sugar and Irish cream. Mix well. Use the filling between cake layers and on top and sides. Icing will set as it cools.

 $\frac{1}{2}$  c crushed chocolate cookies  
Cool Whip                      Hershey chocolate bar, grated

Mix butter, flour and nuts and press into 8" X 12" dish. Sprinkle crushed cookies and press into crust. Bake for 20 minutes at 350°F. Cool. Beat softened cream cheese and add powdered sugar and 1 cup of Cool Whip. Spread over the crust. Mix together chocolate and vanilla pudding. Add milk; stir and let set. Spread over cream cheese layer. Cover with remainder of Cool Whip and add grated Hershey chocolate bar on top. Refrigerate.

$\frac{1}{2}$  c butter                      2 ½ c graham cracker crumbs  
1 pkg chocolate chips    14 oz sweetened condensed milk  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  bag mini marshmallows

Preheat oven to 350°F. Line 13" X 9" pan with foil and place in oven to melt butter. When melted, bring out of oven and sprinkle crumbs evenly over butter. Pour milk evenly over crumbs. Top with chips then cover evenly with marshmallows. Press down firmly. Bake 25 minutes until marshmallows puff and turn golden brown. Let cool. Remove foil from pan and cut into squares.
